HURRICANE MATTHEW

Situation Report No.8 Date: 07 October 2016 (18:00 EST) PAHO HQ- Washington DC



This report is produced by PAHO/WHO in collaboration with PAHO Country Offices, Ministries of Health, and with inputs from official organizations. This report covers the period from 06-07 October 2016 at 13:00 EST.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Hurricane Matthew has severely affected the Sud and Grand'Anse Departments, particularly in the communes of Les Cayes and Jérémie, in Haiti
- Matthew is a Category 3 Hurricane with maximum sustained winds near 120mph (195 km/h)
- A Hurricane Warning is in effect for parts of Florida and 4 states (Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia) have declared a state of emergency
 - Mandatory evacuations for an estimated 2 million people are in effect and there are
 198 shelters with 27,110 occupants across three states
 - In Florida, over 500,000 people are without power
 - Beauford Memorial Hospital in South Carolina has begun evacuating patients
 (approx. 70) and has closed the Emergency Room due to the predicted storm surges
 from Hurricane Matthew

SITUATION OVERVIEW

- On October 4, At 7:00am, Matthew made landfall near Les Anglais, Haiti (estimated pop. 27, 182)
- PAHO has deployed a total of 11 Regional Response Team Experts to 4 countries (see table below)

RESPONSE ACTIONS:

HAITI

- Approx. 300 persons dead mainly in the Southwest peninsula; more than 152,000 people in 500 shelters, in some of them lack of water and food is beginning to show, 58 missing in Grand' Anse; an estimated 186 persons are injured, preliminary evaluations are ongoing, however, access to other areas remain difficult
- The Haitian Civil Protection Agency reports that 350,000 people need assistance
- Over 29,000 houses and public infrastructure are destroyed or severely damaged
- The majority of port infrastructures in the Sud Department are damaged
- Collapse of Petit Goave Bridge has isolated communities in South, Nippes and Grand'Anse
- Technicians from DINEPA Tepac are evaluating the water quality
- Other NGOs (MDM Argentina, Red Cross Haiti, ACF, and ADEMA) are evaluating the situation in Nord Ouest, Sud Est, and Centre departments
- WFP's South East Haiti office estimates that up to 80% of harvest is lost in some areas

PAHO/WHO:

- 4 PAHO-HTI field teams are on the ground as well as a Rapid Response Emergency Unit, in addition 2 more teams will have a presence in Jérémie and Les Cayes
- 3 PAHO experts deployed to complement nearly 50 PAHO-HTI team members supporting hurricane operations
- PAHO has delivered essential medicines and supplies to several departments

Health Facilities

- Most hospitals are receiving hundreds of injured patients because of the hurricane. Some are substituting as non-functioning hospitals
- All have needs for medical supplies, medication, water and personnel
- In 5 departments, out of 10 hospitals or health centers:
 - 6 intact and functioning
 - 1 damaged partially and functioning
 - o 3 damaged and non-functioning

THE BAHAMAS/TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS

- 'All Clear' has been given to 12 islands
- Grand Bahama greatly affected; NEMA has begun their search and rescue activities
- Over 1.3 million people were initially mandatorily evacuated
- Electricity is in the process of being restored in New Providence, assessments are ongoing.

PAHO/WHO:

- PAHO-BHS is still providing support for NEOC operations
- 3 persons affected; 730 persons in shelters
- The MoH has reported leaks and roof damage and Health EOC has been relocated

Health Facilities

 Out of 81 health facilities across the Bahamas, 66 have been confirmed operational, 6 are currently not operational, and the MoH has not been able to communicate with the 9 remainder hospitals

CUBA

- 90% of homes in the community of Baracoa have been damaged; 5 municipalities (176,000 people) in Guantánamo Province remain isolated and the agricultural sector has been damaged
- Over 1 million people were affected by the storm
- Electrical service and water systems have been severely affected
- Assessments are ongoing
- The hurricane could have a "bow" trajectory and threaten the western side of the island next week

Health Facilities

• Electricity generators at Hospital Octavio de la Concepcion and de la Pedraja, in Caracoa collapsed. This will affect more than 130,500 people

JAMAICA

• 2 shelters remain open with 900 occupants

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

- 5 provinces still on yellow alert and 8 on green alert due to possible flooding or river overflowing.
- MoPH began epidemiological surveillance

Government:

- 18,904 people affected; 1,039 people in 21 shelters in 14 provinces; 4 deaths
- 3,174 homes affected and 6 bridges collapsed
- 21 provinces remain under a red alert; yellow alert remains for 5 provinces and green alert for 8, due to possible flash flooding
- 94 aqueducts/water systems are out of service in 8 provinces; electrical systems were severely affected

PAHO/WHO

Health Facilities

 MoH reported that all affected hospitals are now functioning. Damage assessment ongoing for Hospital Municipal de Vicente Noble





COLOMBIA

Government:

- An estimated 15,000 families have been affected
- 13,000 liters (approx. 3400 gallons) of potable water has been delivered by the Civil Defense as part UNGRD




- Bahamas: Vector control supplies
- Jamaica: Water and sanitation supplies
- Haiti: Petit Goave Hospital requested essential medicines and supplies. A request has been placed through GOARN for additional staffing for enhancement of the Alert and Response System. Need for antitetanic vaccine.
