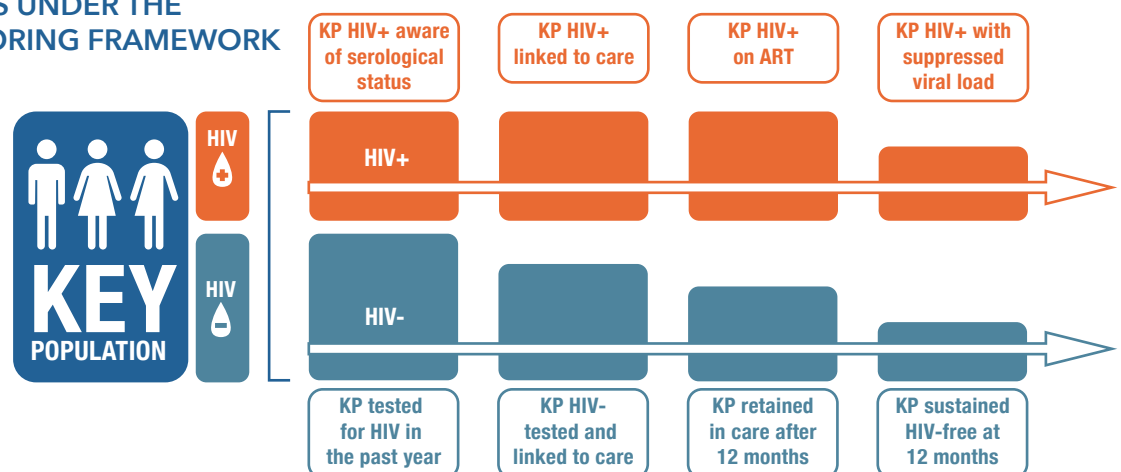

FOR KEY POPULATIONS

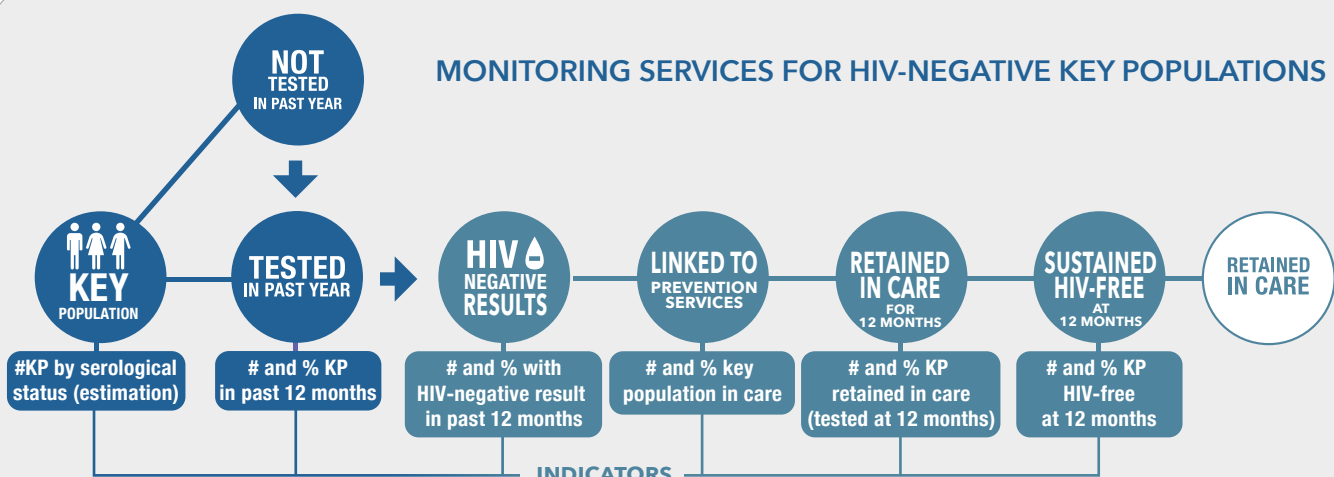
In Latin America and the Caribbean, 70 to 80% of new HIV infections occur in key populations (KP) and their clients and sexual partners. It is critical to monitor HIV and STI prevention services among key populations.

- The PAHO monitoring framework establishes indicators of the continuum of care and prevention of HIV/STIs for key populations.
- Impact is measured in terms of keeping people HIV-free or with undetectable viral load (among HIV positive key populations).
- It implies a longitudinal follow-up of persons through a package of prevention and care services.

CONTINUUM OF HIV PREVENTION AND CARE SERVICES UNDER THE NEW PAHO MONITORING FRAMEWORK



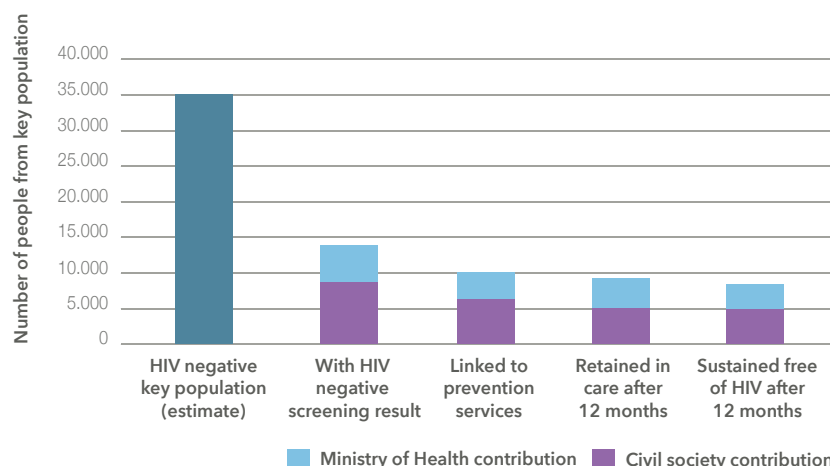
MONITORING SERVICES FOR HIV-NEGATIVE KEY POPULATIONS



MONITORING SERVICES PROVIDED BY CIVIL SOCIETY

- Measuring the contribution of civil society organizations is essential to promote sustainability of services for key populations.
- This tool measures the HIV/STI services for key populations provided by Government and civil society organizations.
