# Welcome Message from Chair of the International Steering and Scientific Committees

I am delighted to invite your participation in the 4th International Cancer Control Congress to be held in Seoul, South Korea from November 3-5, 2011.

The ICCC was established to promote awareness and foster the development of national cancer control programs (NCCPs). Why? Because NCCPs embody the principles of making the benefits of what we know about cancer control accessible and available to all at risk of developing and/or dying from cancer. Better outcomes are more likely if national cancer control plans comprehensively address:

- · incidence, mortality and quality of life;
- mitigate disparities based on ethnic, education, socio-economic and geographic differences;
- · align system capacity with population need;
- encompass the patient journey from pre-clinical cancer through to cure or end-of-life care:
- cancer as a chronic disease with communicable and non-communicable elements; and
- prioritization, coordination and integration of cancer control interventions to maximize effectiveness, efficiency and sustainability of services.

However, the prevalence of NCCPs in WHO-member states ranges from less than 20% to approximately 60% across the low to upper income stratification of World Bank Income Groups (2008) - a reflection of the challenges inherent in global cancer control.

These principles, however, underlie the ability not only to control cancer, but also to address the control of non-communicable diseases (NCDs). Such integrated strategies represent both a necessary and practical reality for all countries, given the burden to society that these diseases represent.

Please join us in Seoul, November 3-5, 2011. Thank you for your consideration of this invitation and I hope to see you there and work together with you. All the best.

Submissions should be original, innovative and should not have been presented elsewhere. All accepted abstracts will be published in the Congress Abstract Book and/or a peer reviewed journal. Selected submissions will be offered presentation in either oral or poster form. The length of the oral presentations is expected to be 15 minutes in duration. The Abstract Review Committee, which will evaluate all submitted abstracts, reserves the right to accept or reject any abstract and make a final decision on the form of presentation. In addition, the Abstract Review Committee reserves the right to relocate submitted abstracts to a different topic and/or session if deemed appropriate.

Abstracts should be submitted in electronic form through the Congress website. (www.iccc4.com) Detailed instructions for preparing and submitting an abstract will be made available on the Congress website. Abstract submissions should adhere to the following guidelines:

- 1. Abstracts should not exceed 300 words in length
- 2. Tables/ graphics/ photos may not be included
- 3. Abstracts will be accepted in English only
- 4. Abstracts should be prepared only in a word processing application or a text editor
