Short Biographies



Sir George Alleyne

Sir George Alleyne, a native of Barbados, became Director of the Pan American Sanitary Bureau (PASB), Regional Office of the World Health Organization (WHO) on 1 February 1995 and completed a second four-year term on 31 January 2003. In 2003 he was elected Director Emeritus of the PASB. From February 2003 until December 2010 he was the UN Secretary General's Special Envoy for HIV/AIDS in the Caribbean. In October 2003 he was appointed Chancellor of the University of the West Indies. He currently holds an Adjunct professorship on the Bloomberg School of Public Health, Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Alleyne has received numerous awards in recognition of his work, including prestigious decorations and national honors from many countries of the Americas. In 1990, he was made Knight Bachelor by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II for his services to Medicine. In 2001, he was awarded the Order of the Caribbean Community, the highest honor that can be conferred on a Caribbean national.

Prof. Janet Beauvais

Janet Beauvais has been a Professor of Policy Practice at the McGill World Platform (MWP) for Health and Economic Convergence at McGill University since March 2009 where she leads projects focused on better understanding the role of the private sector and non-state actors in addressing global health issues such as chronic disease and obesity, food safety, food security and nutrition. Between 2005 and 2009 she was the Director General for the Food Directorate at Health Canada where she was responsible for a group of 400 staff from diverse disciplines delivering a program of scientific research, pre-market evaluation and health risk assessment, policy, standards and regulatory activities for food additives, chemical and microbiological contaminants, nutrients, health claims, and novel foods. She is an epidemiologist and biostatistician who began her career at McGill University and joined Health Canada in 1993 as an epidemiologist/ biostatistician leading projects in the area of cancer and the environment. Between 1995 and 2000 she was Head of the Cancer Screening group at Health Canada. In 2000, she joined Environment Canada as Director of the Existing Chemical Substances Branch and was responsible for developing and implementing internationally precedentsetting approaches to assess the environmental risks of the 23,000 previously un-assessed existing substances and chemicals in Canada.



Mr. Jorge Casimiro

Jorge Casimiro is Director, International Government Relations and Public Affairs at The Coca-Cola Company. In this role, he leads the Company's international government affairs and stakeholder engagement strategies in the areas of health and nutrition, working closely with the Marketing and Scientific & Regulatory Affairs functions. He is the Company's representative to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, as well as to health- and nutrition-focused multilateral and nongovernmental organizations. As co-chair of the International Food & Beverage Alliance, he leads The Coca-Cola Company's engagement with

the World Health Organization and its regional offices. Additionally, Jorge has geographic responsibilities for Latin America. Mr. Casimiro joined The Coca-Cola Company in 2001 as Manager of Special Projects in the Office of the Chairman and CEO. Beatriz is executive director of the InterAmerican Heart Foundation, an organization dedicated to prevention of heart diseases and stroke in the Americas. She spearheads initiatives such as "Community Interventions for Health," in Mexico City addressing diet, physical activity and tobacco; and "Smokefree Mexico", a program that has resulted Mexico City becoming 100% smoke free. In addition, she helped organized initiatives such as tobacco warning labels in the Caribbean, the Healthy Caribbean Coalition, Journalism Awards, tobacco control research, emergency cardiovascular care (ECC) networks and training, smoking cessation training, salt reduction, women and heart disease, among others. She is an investigator and organizer of the CARMELA Study of 7 Latin American cities to evaluate risk factors of heart disease. Her organization received the 2009 Luther L. Terry Awards for Exemplary Leadership in Tobacco Control. She is in the Executive Committee of Global Advocacy for Physical Activity, and INWAT, International Network of Women Against Tobacco. She holds PhD from Rutgers University and BS summa cum laude from the University of Illinois. She was born and raised in Buenos Aires, Argentina.



Ms. Kim Elmslie

In the position of Director General, Centre for Chronic Disease Prevention and Control, Ms. Elmslie is responsible for leading the Public Health Agency of Canada's initiatives in chronic disease; including surveillance, risk assessment, prevention and management activities. Academically trained in epidemiology and biostatistics, Ms. Elmslie brings a strong science base and extensive program and policy experience to her work in public health. Ms. Elmslie has held several senior positions in the federal public service. She served as Executive Director of the Canadian Biotechnology Secretariat from 2003 - 2007, where she was responsible for the coordination of seven federal departments working to develop a coherent approach to biotechnology that included the economic, regulatory, ethical and social issues triggered by increasing applications of biotechnology across sectors of the economy. As Executive Director, Health Research Secretariat, Health Canada from 2000 B 2003, Ms. Elmslie facilitated partnerships with the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, established the department's first Research Ethics Board, and launched the inaugural Health Canada Research Forum. Previous to this, Ms. Elmslie was Director, National Health Research and Development Program (1998-2000), Health Canada's extramural research funding organization on applied health research including training and career development of young researchers. In her role as Director, Bureau of Epidemiology and Surveillance B National AIDS Strategy. Ms. Elmslie established the first national AIDS reporting system in collaboration with provinces and territories and ensured this information was utilized in policy and program development and in public information. Ms. Elmslie was a member of the Canadian Breast Cancer Research Initiative (CBCRI) B now the Canadian Cancer Research Alliance (CBCRA) B from 1997-2003. During 2003, she was Chair of the Board of Directors, leading this public, private and voluntary sector partnership.

She launched CDC's state-based National Network of Tobacco Cessation Quitlines, which for the first time provided access to telephone counseling and local follow-up for all U.S. smokers; played a pivotal role in leading CDC's efforts to establish youth tobacco surveillance activities in 150 countries around the world; led the successful CDC tobacco-free campus initiative; and led the national strategy for the release of two landmark Surgeon General's reports. Prior to her service in OSH, Ms. Henson served as the deputy director of CDC's National Center for Environmental health and chief of the Program Services Branch in NCCDPHP's Division of Cancer Prevention and Control. She implemented

the nation's first-ever breast and cervical cancer early detection program that today supports screening for millions of underserved women nationwide. Ms. Henson has been the recipient of several significant honors, including the prestigious Presidential Rank Award for Meritorious Service in 2007 the Surgeon General's Certificate of Appreciation for Exemplary effort in the development of the Surgeon General's Report on the Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke in 2006 and the Jeffery P. Koplan Award for outstanding leadership in global tobacco prevention and control in 2004. Prior to joining CDC in 1990 Ms. Henson served in several public health leadership positions with the Massachusetts Department of Public Health in Boston. Ms. Henson earned her Master's in Public Health and Masters of Science in Social Work from Columbia University

Dr. Marcos Espinal Fuentes is currently the manager of Health Surveillance and Disease Prevention and Control at the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO). Dr Espinal's portfolio includes five major areas: communicable diseases, non-communicable chronic diseases, risk and outbreak communication, health information & analysis, and veterinary public health. Dr Espinal, a national of the Dominican Republic, holds a medical degree from the Universidad Autónoma de Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic (1985); he is a pediatrician, with three years of residency at the Robert Reid Children's Hospital of Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. He obtained a master's degree in public health (1990) and a doctorate in public health (1995) from the University of California at Berkeley School of Public Health.
