More than **580 million** people have been vaccinated under the umbrella of this initiative.

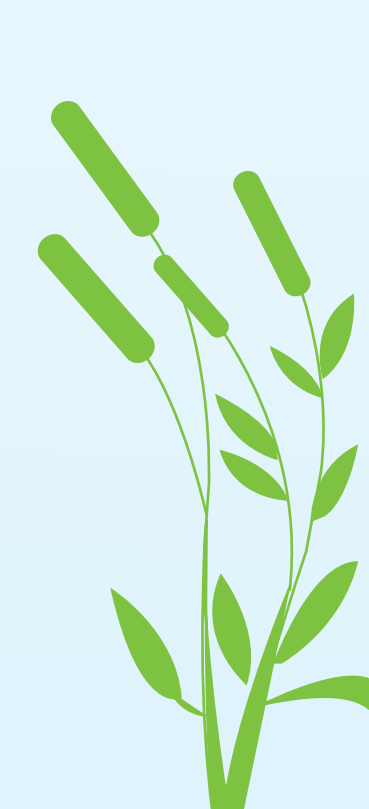
In subsequent years, other regions of the world have joined forces to create similar initiatives and the first World Immunization Week was celebrated in 2012.
