These activities are intended to create awareness about the available rehabilitation services and where they are located.

Rehabilitation providers in Regions 2, 3, 9 and 10 would also be participating and have planned their own activities.

These include visits to health centres, open days, lectures for rehabilitation practitioners and ambulance attendants, the available services, blood drives and awareness presentations to the public.

Rehab week is an annual event and is aimed at promoting the value and importance of rehabilitation, highlighting the various aspects of the services provided and giving recognition to professionals who provide these services.

Rehabilitation services are offered at hospitals in all the Administrative Regions, except Region Eight, and at the Ptolemy Reid Rehabilitation centre and Palms Geriatric Institution, in Georgetown.

These institutions provide inpatient and outpatient services to persons who experience debilitating illnesses and attention is given to persons who need physiotherapy, occupational, speech, audiology, orthotics, prosthetics and vocational training.
